



Coping with suffering:

Genesis 16:1-2

Now Sarai, Abram's wife, had borne him no children. But she had an Egyptian slave named Hagar; so she said to Abram, "The LORD has kept me from having children. Go, sleep with my slave; perhaps I can build a family through her."

Genesis 16:2-4

Abram agreed to what Sarai said. So after
Abram had been living in Canaan ten years,
Sarai his wife took her Egyptian slave
Hagar and gave her to her husband to be
his wife. He slept with Hagar,
and she conceived.

Genesis 16:4-5

When she knew she was pregnant, she began to despise her mistress. Then Sarai said to Abram, "You are responsible for the wrong I am suffering. I put my slave in your arms, and now that she knows she is pregnant, she despises me. May the LORD judge between you and me."

"I'm running away from my mistress Sarai," she answered. Then the angel of the LORD told her, "Go back to your mistress and submit to her."



Genesis 16:11

The angel of the LORD also said to her:
"You are now pregnant
and you will give birth to a son.
You shall name him Ishmael,
for the LORD has heard of your misery.



"He will be a wild donkey of a man; his hand will be against everyone and everyone's hand against him, and he will live in hostility toward all his brothers."

- Beer Lahai Roi = Well of the Living One who sees me
- * Ishmael = God hears



- 75 when he left Haran (Genesis 12)
- * 86 when Ishmael was born (Genesis 16)
- * 100 when Isaac was born (Genesis 21)

- * Slave

- * Mistreated by religious people
- * Forced into an exploitative sexual relationship



- * Hagar is the only woman to receive a promise of many descendants.
- * Hagar is the only person who assigns a name to God.




He grew up before him like a tender shoot, and like a root out of dry ground.

He had no beauty or majesty to attract us to him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire him.




He was despised and rejected by mankind, a man of suffering, and familiar with pain. Like one from whom people hide their faces he was despised, and we held him in low esteem.
